**Objection 1: Revelation 8:13 and 11:14's "woe" sequence**

The eagle announces three "woes" corresponding to the last three trumpets. Revelation 9:12 states "The first woe has passed" after the fifth trumpet. Revelation 11:14 states "The second woe has passed" after the sixth trumpet. The phrase "has passed" could imply that the entire judgment described in each woe (including the five-month torment of the locusts and the killing of a third of mankind) ran its full course before the next trumpet sounded. **How Schirmpf answers this objection:** He distinguishes between the "blast" (divine decree) and the "effect" (unfolding consequences). The sequential announcement of "has passed" for Woe 1 and Woe 2 does not require time gaps between trumpet blasts; it tracks the decrees themselves, which were issued in rapid succession. The interlude of chapters 10–11 (the little scroll, two witnesses) is visionary parenthetical material, not a chronological gap.

#### **Objection 2: The two witnesses' 1,260 days (Revelation 11:3)**

If the seventh trumpet sounds moments after the sixth trumpet, and the sixth trumpet is the second woe, the two witnesses prophesy for 1,260 days — the entire second half of the Tribulation. Yet they are killed, resurrected, and caught up to heaven *before* the seventh trumpet sounds (Revelation 11:11–15). How can their 1,260-day ministry fit inside a compressed "moments apart" trumpet sequence? This suggests the trumpets span more than moments.

**How Schirmpf answers this objection:** The two witnesses are not the Church. Their ministry runs the entire 1,260 days of the Great Tribulation (the second half). The sixth trumpet *blast* occurs at the beginning of that period. The seventh trumpet sounds after their ministry concludes, near the end of the 1,260 days, but still within the rapid trumpet sequence in the sense that the trumpet judgments themselves are initiation events. Schirmpf argues the trumpet blasts are the *initiation* of judgments, not the judgments themselves unfolding over time. The

seventh trumpet initiates the final phase, even if the effects unfold over the remaining period.

### **Objection 3: The "last trumpet" as Feast of Trumpets imagery**

Some scholars argue Paul's "last trumpet" in 1 Corinthians 15:52 refers to the Feast of Trumpets (Rosh Hashanah) — the final blast of the festival sequence (the tekiah gedolah) — not to a prophetic trumpet in Revelation. On this reading, Paul is using festival imagery to describe a sudden, final gathering call for the Church, not pointing to a specific numbered trumpet in John's vision. The connection to Revelation's seventh trumpet is therefore a category error — Paul is not writing about the same kind of "trumpet" at all.

**How Schrimpf answers this objection:** The Feast of Trumpets typology is real but not exclusive. Zephaniah explicitly calls the Day of the Lord "a day of trumpet" — prophetic language, not merely festival language. Joel opens his Day of the Lord description with a trumpet blast. Jesus uses trumpet language for the gathering of the elect in Matthew 24:31. Paul is drawing from the entire prophetic tradition, not isolated festival imagery. Moreover, if Paul meant only festival imagery, why use the specific phrase "last trumpet" rather than simply "a trumpet"? The word "last" implies sequence and finality that finds its clearest home at Revelation's climactic seventh trumpet — a trumpet that also appears in a Day of the Lord, wrath-arrival, kingdom-announcement context. The convergence across multiple independent witnesses (Jesus, Paul, John, and the Old Testament prophets) is too extensive to dismiss as a category error.

## **Required Summary Statements**

### **1. Which position's overall score is most uncertain and why?**

**Seventh Trumpet (8.0/10) has the highest uncertainty** — not because the position is weak, but because it has not yet received the same volume of critical scholarly engagement as Pre-Trib or Post-Trib. The rapid trumpet sequence

inference, the Gog of Magog alignment, and the Zechariah 12 re-reading are novel syntheses. With sustained peer critique, the score could adjust  $\pm 1.5$  points in either direction. Pre-Trib and Post-Trib have centuries of debate behind them; their weaknesses are well-mapped. Seventh Trumpet's weaknesses are less fully explored.

horse → martyrs → cosmic signs → great multitude). The transformation from disembodied souls under the altar (Revelation 6:9–11) to glorified multitude before the throne (Revelation 7:9–17) finds its most natural explanation at a resurrection/Rapture event.

2. **Paul's "last trumpet"** (1 Corinthians 15:52) finds its only numbered home in Scripture at **Revelation's seventh trumpet** — which is also the only trumpet where kingdom, reward, and wrath converge simultaneously (Revelation 11:15–18).
3. **The wrath sequence problem** that plagues both Pre-Trib and Post-Trib is resolved: wrath arrives at the seventh trumpet (Revelation 11:18) and is completed in the bowls (Revelation 15:1). The Seventh Trumpet view places the seventh trumpet *before* the bowls, preserving arrival-then-completion sequence.
4. **2 Thessalonians 2:1–4** reads naturally: the gathering cannot occur until the abomination of desolation. The Seventh Trumpet view does not need to sever this connection or redefine the falling away as a generational trend.
5. **Revelation 19's wedding feast** occurs before the Second Coming. The Seventh Trumpet view provides the necessary gap (between the seventh trumpet and Revelation 19) for the Bema Seat and marriage supper.
6. **The Gog of Magog battle** (Ezekiel 38–39) and **Zechariah 12** align with the Day of the Lord's opening rather than requiring separate battles at different points on the timeline.

No other position resolves this many tensions across this many independent passages without requiring significant "rescue operations" (redefinition of terms, separation of passages that appear connected, or insertion of unstated events).

## **5. The two or three most significant unresolved tensions in the top-ranked position**

**Tension 1: The rapid trumpet sequence is inferred, not explicit.**

The claim that all seven trumpets sound in "moments apart, all on the same day" is a reasonable inference from the eagle's imminent warning in Revelation 8:13 and the absence of temporal markers between trumpet blasts. However, no verse states this directly. The two witnesses' 1,260-day ministry operates within the sixth trumpet period, which *does* suggest extended time between the sixth trumpet blast and the seventh trumpet's effects. Schrimpf distinguishes between blast (instant) and effect (extended), but this distinction, while defensible, is not explicitly drawn in the text. A critic could argue that the narrative structure of Revelation — with visionary interludes, parenthetical material, and recapitulation — does not require a compressed timeline at all, and that reading the sequence as extended in time is equally (or more) plausible.

**Tension 2: The identification of the Gog of Magog battle with the Day of the Lord's opening is novel and requires further demonstration.**

Schrimpf's ten-point alignment between Ezekiel 38–39 and Day of the Lord passages is extensive. However, classic dispensationalism has long placed Gog of Magog either before the Tribulation (as an invasion Israel survives naturally) or after the Millennium (Revelation 20:7–10). The "before the Tribulation" view points to Ezekiel 38:8 ("in the latter years") and 38:11 ("unwalled villages, peaceful people") as describing conditions before Antichrist's covenant breaks. The "after the Millennium" view points to Revelation 20:8's mention of Gog and Magog as the nations deceived by Satan after the thousand years. Schrimpf's placement — at the opening of the Day of the Lord, during the Tribulation — is a third option that requires explaining why Ezekiel's sequence does not conflict with Revelation's. The alignment is promising but needs more critical engagement with the objections from both standard pre-millennial and amillennial readings.

**Tension 3: The Great Multitude (Revelation 7) as the raptured Church requires distinguishing the Church from Tribulation saints in a way the text does not explicitly do.**

Pre-Trib solves this by saying the Great Multitude is *only* Tribulation saints (post-Rapture converts). Seventh Trumpet says the Great Multitude includes the Church raptured at the seventh trumpet plus Tribulation saints from the earlier part of the

Tribulation. The text says they are "the ones who come out of the great tribulation" (Revelation 7:14). This fits the Seventh Trumpet view if "the great tribulation" refers to the *entire* period from the abomination of desolation to the seventh trumpet. However, a critic could argue that the phrase "come out of the great tribulation" means the tribulation is *over* — which would place the multitude at the *end* of the Tribulation (Post-Trib position). The Seventh Trumpet view must show that "come out of" does not require the tribulation period to be fully completed, only that they have *emerged* from it — which could happen mid-period at the Rapture. The Greek *ek* ("out of") can indicate source/origin without requiring the period to be finished. This is defensible but requires the reader to accept a mid-period emergence as the natural reading, which is not self-evident.

## Methodological Note

The Seventh Trumpet position's higher score reflects its novel synthesis of existing passages into a coherent timeline that resolves inter-passage tensions other positions manage only with difficulty. However, "novel" also means "less tested." The confidence ratings reflect this: Seventh Trumpet scores are marked Medium rather than High because the position lacks the volume of critical engagement that century-old positions have received. A responsible evaluation must distinguish between *current explanatory power* and *established certainty*. Seventh Trumpet currently has higher explanatory power; Pre-Trib has higher established certainty in the academy. The score reflects the former, not the latter.
